LECTURE Yiddish Literature as a Response to Apocalypse

Katerina Kuznetsova

"Yiddish Literature as a Response to Apocalypse" explores how poets and writers have used Yiddish to confront the major tragedies of Jewish history. Since becoming a written language, Yiddish has been a medium for reflecting on loss, violence, and survival. The 20th century in particular — marked by pogroms, World War I, the destruction of the shtetl, and the Holocaust — was both the most devastating era for Jewish communities and the most prolific period for Yiddish literature. Alongside this literary tradition, one urgent question has remained: who needs Yiddish when the world is ending? Will there be another generation to read these texts? In this session, we will examine selected examples of Yiddish poetry and prose to explore different responses to historical trauma and radical change, and discuss the role of literature in preserving memory and imagining survival after catastrophe.

In 2011 and 2012, Yiddish Summer Weimar explored the connections between Yiddish and German folk music — their history, present, and future. These years were eye-opening and inspiring in many ways, and projects such as AlpenKlezmer and Voices of Ashkenaz emerged from this work. Since then, Andreas Schmitges has continued researching this field and will present how Ashkenazic and German folk cultures interact and connect through song, dance, and instrumental music.

Muzsikás: The Lost Jewish Music of Transylvania

One of the most celebrated folk ensembles in the world, Muzsikás from Budapest rarely tours anymore and has no other scheduled performances in Germany. Over more than fifty years, they have redefined how audiences hear Hungarian traditional music — and rescued an entire chapter of Jewish musical heritage from oblivion. Their concert will draw on various points in their remarkable career, including music from their groundbreaking album Máramaros: The Lost Jewish Music of Transylvania. Founded in 1973 at the heart of Budapest's táncház (dance house) movement, Muzsikás are winners of Hungary's Kossuth Prize, the country's highest state award for artists.

Khupe (Berlin) & Lerner Moguilevsky Duo (Buenos Aires)

The 2026 Festival closes with two legendary klezmer duos for an unforgettable evening of instrumental music. From Berlin, Khupe — clarinetist Christian Dawid and accordionist Sanne Möricke — pioneers of the city's klezmer scene, performing together since the mid-1990s. From Buenos Aires, Lerner Moguilevsky Duo — César Lerner and Marcelo Moguilevsky — among South America's most highly regarded performers of klezmer and improvised music, with a four-decade career that has taken them to stages around the world. Two duos, two continents — one shared musical language. Afterwards: bring your instruments for the traditional Sunday evening jam session, with Eastern European inspired cocktails.
